**Notes from Fr. Dirk**

My Dear People of God:

My grandparents were John Rankin and Estella Rowland Dunfee. No one ever used Gram's given name. To Grampa she was Ted. I'm not sure he ever knew her real name. The adults (a relative term) (Get it? *Relatives? Relative term?* As Fr. Joseph reminds me, it's good to start the day with a hearty laugh.) knew her as *Mauer* (which I long understood to mean *mother* in Pennsylvania Dutch but which I have since learned does not but in fact means *wall* which somehow seems not quite to fit). Anyway, Gram and Grampa lived in Tucson in a turquoise single-wide that Grampa called, simply and descriptively, *the trailer. Manufactured home?* Not for him, such effete foolishness. I loved the trailer, and I loved the trailer park: trees, flower beds, birds, a swimming pool, friendly neighbors. And in the kitchen of the turquoise single-wide, a wall oven. And above that a cupboard. Not very exciting, an above-the-oven cupboard. But wait.

As do all the men in the family (an unsubtle hint), Grampa loved – intensely, flourishingly, breathtakingly – tapioca pudding. Gram did not. No ma'am she did not, and she refused to make the stuff. (The subject of a less-heated-but-decades-long campaign in the hot and endless war between Mom and Mother-in-Law was tapioca pudding and Gram's refusal: When they'd visit us in California, Mom would meet

them at the door with a smile at once warm (Grampa) and chilling (Mauer) and a big bowl of homemade tapioca pudding. And therewith throwing down the gauntlet. ("And gentlemen in England now abed [s]hall think themselves accurs'd they were not here," Henry V, Act 4, Scene 3). So much did Grampa – that dear, naïve man – love tapioca pudding that when he and I would go to the store he'd head down the pudding aisle (no juice aisles back then) and toss a box of tapioca pudding into the cart, saying: "Let's get some tapioca and see if Gram will make it for us." When we got home he'd hand the box to Gram who would take it and wordlessly lob it into the cupboard – to be jammed in with its 500 or so companion boxes of tapioca pudding. Grampa was a hopeful man.

OK. Climate change. Ninety scientists from 40 nations (including, perhaps ironically, our own), working together in a panel that was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize (an award aspired to – on other grounds – by our own chief executive) have ratcheted up their warnings about climate change in a just-released report (<http://www.ipcc.ch/report/sr15/>). The punchline? Absent a mammoth, coordinated and worldwide effort to reduce carbon emissions, the worst aspects of climate change – famine, drought, mass extinctions, wildfires – will manifest much sooner than previously imagined. More sobering still: We have **ten years** to get our act together. One decade. Four years after Loyola's 100th jubilee in 2024.

There are any number of ways to react to such news: anger, frustration, sadness, resignation, acceptance, determination, hopelessness. The current administration's approach is more on the order of, "Why bother?" Take the recent proposal to roll back auto fuel efficiency standards: One reason given in the administration's astonishing argument is that we're headed for disaster anyway and so any efforts we might make to reduce carbon emissions would be pointless. No, I'm not joking.

How's that for inviting us to abandon hope? Whatever, millions and millions of Americans – left, right, and center – are sending their regrets. Undaunted, states continue to develop and implement their own programs to reduce carbon emissions. Citizens are forging new alliances and moving ahead, regardless. Americans of all political stripes are asking for a more positive response – and for action – from their elected leaders. Hope.

Which brings us to Catholic Christians. Like so many of you, this particular Catholic Christian's emotions run the gamut. But here's the thing: Without hope, there is no Gospel. Without the Gospel, there is no hope. ("Wait just a minute. Didn't we hear you say the same thing about justice?" Yes I did. Wanna make something of it?) As we look ahead to Advent and the retelling of the story of the life, death and resurrection of Christ, perhaps it's helpful to bear in mind that we already know how the tale ends: not in death, but in Life. In that same story are found hope – and Hope, in the person of Christ. None of this will be easy, but we can do the hard work ahead of us. Why? ("OK buster, now you'd really better wait a minute. Haven't we heard you say all along that we shouldn't ask *why* questions?" No comment.) Here's why: We are Christians. Whether or not others have given up hope, we live in hope. And hope does not disappoint.
